
Community exhibition of work inspired by the Portage Lake Lift Bridge Kerredge Gallery June 7-18, 2022

We've been featuring articles and memories of the beginnings of the Community Arts Center on Quincy Street but there is 20 years of history that comes prior to the founding of the Arts Center!

From the Archives: 1971-1981


Long-time supporter and past board member, Terry Monson spent some time looking through our early records at Michigan Tech Archives and summared our first ten years. This brief synopsis was gleaned from his notes.

From its inception, the CCCAC has been an umbrella organization which sponsored and promoted local arts activity in the area. Grant funding from the Michigan Council for the Arts, now Michigan Arts and Culture Council (MACC) supported the CCCAC and provided funding for the performing arts including Keweenaw Symphony Orchestra and Youth Symphony and to fund performances by the Guthrie Theater Players and Christopher Ballet (a two-week dance program with lectures and demonstrations in all schools and two performances). Allocated funds from the United Arts Fund came through CCCAC to support Copper Country Suzuki Association and Copper Country Chorale. Separate MACC funding for visual arts supported workshops by visiting artists at MTU and ArtTrain which came through the UP in 1976 on its way to Wisconsin. The CCCAC with MACC grants also helped fund the Monument to a Miner statue which was dedicated on June 25, 1980.

The CCCAC had a very small budget. Membership dues were \$3 for individuals and \$10 for organizations. Meetings were held in various church basements, banks, campus buildings and private homes. In 1977 the first Poor Artists Sale took place at Dee Stadium which helped to fund the Copper Country Gallery Exhibition, held in various locations eventually finding its home at Michigan Tech's McArdle Theatre. Establishing an arts center is noted in discussion as early at 1974 with MACC grants to fund research and planning efforts. Several locations were considered over the years before settling in downtown Hancock.
