

We've been featuring articles and memories of the beginnings of the Community Arts Center on Quincy Street but there is 20 years of history that comes prior to the founding of the Arts Center! Our friend and founding member, Jan Dalquist, sent us this article about the very beginnings of the Arts Council 50 years ago. Next month we will have a synopsis of the first ten years of the CCCAC and the many ways it supported arts and culture in the Copper Country.

"The CCCAC was formed following a visit from the Michigan Council for the Arts. Dave Geddes, Michigan Tech's first Dean of Arts and Sciences, as a new-comer to the Copper Country, had joined the Copper Country chorale. Isabelle Hagen, as the grand dame of music and theater in the area, was the chorale accompanist and Bill Powers, head of the new department of Humanities were likely at that first meeting. In forming a committee they asked Lenore Evans, a visual artist specializing in watercolor and pen and ink drawing to join them. Community members, Bob Olson, owner of WMPL radio station, Dr. Jack Ziegler, and I, a dabbler (at that time) in piano, vocal and organ (I sang in Isabelle's church choir and occasionally subbed at the organ for church services) made up the rest of the committee.

We held our meetings in the dining room of the Douglass House in one of the niches along the west side of the main hall. (The Douglass House dining facility was at one time Houghton's response to Calumet's Miscowaubik Club.) Of the committee, Dave Geddes was elected chair, Bill Powers treasurer, and the job of secretary fell to me. Applying for 501c3 tax exempt status with the State, setting a purpose, and writing by-laws were our first items of business. The time was the winter of 1972, I believe.

What a great boon to our area the Copper Country Community Arts Council has been! I am proud to be a founding member." -Jan Dalquist

posters from the collection of Hamilton Wood Type and Printing Museum Kerredge Gallery May 4-28

The exhibition includes a selection of advertising and show posters on loan from the Hamilton Wood Type and Printing Museum in Two Rivers, Wisconsin. All posters were printed from hand carved wood blocks from Enquirer Printing in Cincinnati and Globe Printing in Chicago, dating from the 1920s to the 1970s. The type-based pieces in this exhibition are generally Hamilton wood type but other type used date back to the late 1880s. These posters were re-printed at the Hamilton Museum over the last seven years as both collections were catalogued. The majority of them were printed by the Museum's Master Printer, Jim Moran.
